How Sunday School began

Cinglishman Robert Raikes, born in 1735, was a Christian layman who was pained to see unschooled children working six days a week in factories or mines. On Sundays, children roamed the streets, often getting into trouble. Most didn't know how to read or write and knew nothing about Christ or the church.



As Raikes labored to reform England's prison system, he no-

ticed that many children were imprisoned, stirring him to action on their behalf. He arranged for halls and homes to be used for educational purposes on Sundays, the one day children didn't have to work. He found volunteers to teach reading, writing and math, as well as the Bible and Christian beliefs.

The first Sunday school class was held in July 1780. Amazingly, by 1788 some 250,000 children were attending such schools. This occurred despite some people's opposition to the education of lower-class children.

Countless boys and girls have attended Sunday school classes since then, thanks to Raikes, who brought Christ's light and love to children around the world.

Kelly says, "My first job in the music business was at age 7 when I helped my grandparents in their recording studio in Broadway, Virginia. I thought shrink-wrapping *cassette tapes was the biggest thing in the world!* Kelly has now turned her childhood dream into a reality.

Kelly began singing in the school choir at the age of 9, and in the year 2000, she began her career as a Country/Bluegrass Artist. Her career led her to receive 18 Awards from the Tennessee Country Music Association (TCMA), and the North America Country Music Association International (NACMAI). Kelly also had an original single, titled "YaWanna Bet" that reached #2 on the Country Music charts in Australia.

> As a Country/Bluegrass Artist, Kelly recorded five albums, including a tribute album, titled "Remember West Virginia Coal". This album was a tribute to her hometown of Upshur County, West Virginia, where the Sago Mine Tragedy occurred in January 2006.

In early 2014, Kelly's singing career advanced to an even greater level when God called her into the Gospel Music Ministry. She is now a Southern Gospel Recording Artist, and has released her debut Gospel Álbum titled, "Because He Loved Me".

In September 2015, Kelly released her debut single, "Because He Loved Me" to national radio, which reached #12 on the SGN Scoops Top 100, #16 on the Southern Gospel Magazine Top 40, and #53 on the Singing News Top 80.

Kelly's latest single, "Midnight Cry" reached #1 on the Music To Radio Top 40, and is still appearing on multiple Gospel Music charts, including the Christian Voice TOP 100. In 2016, Kelly received Female Vocalist of the Year at the 2016 Crimson Music Awards, bringing her total to 19 awards throughout her Gospel, Country, & Bluegrass career.

Kelly's highly-anticipated follow-up album, "I Believe", was released in March 2017. Kelly says "I am extremely blessed to be able to do what I love, and to be able to use the talent God has given me, and to share His word in song. If I can bless someone with my music, and lead them closer to the Lord, then my mission has been accomplished. I want everyone to be able to experience the joy of having God in their life."

Ted Baehr, a Christian who monitors moral content in media, discovered that films containing a strong moral and ethical worldview make more money than films that don't. On average, films that reflect Christian faith and values averaged \$75.6 million, while those with lower standards recouped only \$26.9 million.
