The Deacons' Fellowship Fund was used to make distributions to several families who were identified as being in particular need during the year. Donations are collected at the close of the Morning Worship Service on the Sundays that Communion Services are held. We are thankful for those donations to the fund.

The congregation gave food and finances to support the annual Deacon and Deaconess Adopt-A-Family project. The donations were used to purchase canned ham and perishables needed for the food boxes for the families. This year (2017) the outreach program helped 12 families in need at Christmas time.

We continue to sponsor *The Buckhannon Baptist*. Pastor Jay, Betty Norvell, and editor John Puffenbarger submitted monthly articles. We were saddened by the death of Betty Norvell in August. Her articles titled "Afterthoughts" discussed some of the Pastor's sermons each month, and were appreciated by our readers.

> Future projects include carpet for the parsonage and the Hart Avenue ramp rebid.




