 \mathcal{Y}_{ou} may know that St. Patrick used shamrocks to teach about the Trinity, but did vou know these other facts about him?

- St. Patrick wasn't Irish. (His parents were Roman citizens living in either Scotland or Wales.)
- He was kidnapped and sold as a slave at age 16. After escaping six years later, he joined a monastery in England.
- March 17 is the date of St. Patrick's death, not his birth. He died in 461 A.D.
- The color originally associated with St. Patrick is blue, not green.
- The harp, not the shamrock, is the national symbol of Ireland.

Soar like an eagle

Several years ago, Betty and I visited a museum four miles south of Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The museum was located where Wilbur and Orville Wright made history on December 17, 1903 when they flew the first motorized plane.

For several years, the brothers had wondered, "Wouldn't it be great to soar like an eagle?" They watched birds fly and decided that birds changed the angle of the ends of their wings to make their bodies roll right or left.

They decided this would also be a good way for a flying machine to turn—to "bank" or "lean" into the turn just like a bird—and just like a person riding a bicycle, an experience with which they were thoroughly familiar.

Other people were trying to build a flying machine, but the Wright brothers were the first to invent aircraft controls that made fixed-wing powered flight possible. The brothers' fundamental breakthrough was their invention of three-axis control, which enabled the pilot to steer the aircraft effectively and to maintain its equilibrium.

In order to fly like an eagle the brothers had to do things and act on their knowledge. They had to build the plane using the right materials. They had to design an engine that was both powerful enough and light enough. Then they had to equip their plane with all the necessary controls they had to learn to use.

In order for us Christians to soar like an eagle as we follow Christ requires the same kind of things. If a Christian is to be more active in church, there is information we need to know and things we need to do.

We can learn to fly spiritually by following the lessons Jesus taught in the Beatitudes. The first four beatitudes are things that growing Christians have to know. And the next four deal with things that Christians have to do.

God has created us to soar like eagles. Sometimes we may feel frustrated, stressed, tired overwhelmed and unfulfilled.

Isaiah 40:30 says, "but those who hope in the Lord will renew their strength. They will soar on wings like eagles; they will run and not grow weary, they will walk and not be faint.



A potluck of people

Many congregations enjoy gathering for potluck dinners — meals largely unplanned, when people bring food to share. Usually, the main dishes, salads and desserts balance out. The fun is the variety mixing together on a plate and the surprise factor of what's contributed.

Churches and communities — even families — are potlucks of a sort, too. When groups assemble, each person contributes something unique and sometimes unexpected. When all is mixed together, the whole is truly greater than the sum of the parts.

At these potlucks, a beautiful balance often results: One person is a good singer, another writes well; some are strong leaders, others dependable team members; some are traditional, others innovative. Together, it's delicious!

Potlucks are sometimes called covered-dish dinners. But don't keep your gifts "covered"! Share them because you're a valued part of the whole.

The first meeting of the church in 1817 listed 24 members, most of whom had been members of the Mount Zion Baptist Church (Parkersburg). Rev. James McAboy, a newly ordained minister, was named as pastor.

The congregation met in homes, in the county courthouse and at a school until a structure could be erected. Numerous worship gatherings and Sunday Schools were sponsored by the church and these laid the foundation for some of the churches that currently make up the Parkersburg Association.

Dear Friends:

Most of us are able to keep clear in our minds the origin and goal of Christian ministry. Its origin is in Christ, who gives spiritual gifts and gifted people to the church.

Its goal is the building of the body of Christ in knowledge, faith and love. Less clear is the living, dynamic, God-appointed process that moves from origin to goal. Notice carefully what the following verses teach us. God gives to the church spiritual leaders whose role it is to equip saints for ministry.

The Apostle Paul echoes this truth in Ephesians 4:11-13: "The gifts he gave were that some would be apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, some pastors and teachers, ¹² to equip the saints for the work of ministry, for building up the body of Christ, ¹³ until all of us come to the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to maturity, to the measure of the full stature of Christ."

God's pattern for producing people with powerful faith and genuine love is not to have the pastor-teachers do all the work of the ministry. They are to equip the saints to do the ministry. They are you—all of you—who have set yourselves apart for God through faith in Christ. According to God's pattern, the building of the body in faith and love is the immediate result of the ministry of the laity.

The Lord Jesus Christ intends every member of the church to do the work of the ministry. The intention of ministry is to build up each other's faith and love. God's design is to use human support and encouragement to sustain the faith of his children and to lighten the burdens they bear in the service of love.

The America for Christ Offering (AFC) 2018 reminds us that it is in our service to the church and the community that many experience the Christ in us. We are encouraged by this year's theme to **Come Alongside People and Build Them Up.**

I am asking you to join me in giving generously to this year's AFC offering and help us to reach our goal as we partner in home mission. Our goal at First Baptist is \$ 1,000, which will be received during March.

From Pastor Jay

Hebrews 12 (ESV) ...let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, 2 looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God. 3 Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted.

In the first Star Wars movie, chief bad guy Darth Vader shared, "I find your lack of faith disturbing." I was incredibly blessed to spend this past weekend with Jacob and two of his friends at the Sr. High Convention in Hurricane, WV. In our car time, the boys watched a few Star Wars movies! The verses you read above were read at every session (5 in all) and our focus was to grow and increase in faith. Not in the ways of 'The Force' but in a life-long journey and walk with Jesus Christ. We had a great weekend and I believe their lives, our church families, and our community will benefit.

The theme given to several hundred students from our state was to run our race with Jesus, to do this we are to Strengthen Our Endurance. Chris Campbell, a counselor and staff of Freedom in Christ ministry, explained that we can strengthen our endurance by the five helps you'll see below. I took a lot of notes during the weekend and here are the main thoughts. The following help us to increase our capacity to run the race.

Lighten your load. We are weighed down by sin. This is our nature, not only through the sins we have committed but the sin that were born into (Ephesians 2:1-3). We are dominated by sin through the world, the flesh, and the devil. But, God does not leave us there. "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us...made us alive together with Christ (2:4-5)." We have a new nature and new identity in Christ who is not content to leave us in our sin. We lighten our load through giving them over to Jesus our sin bearer, who forgives us of our sin.

Strengthen your faith. Chris gave three helpful statements of faith. (1) Faith depends on the object of our faith. We place our faith in Jesus who loves us, saves us, and is the same yesterday, today, and forever (Hebrews 13:8). (2) Faith depends on our knowledge of that object. We are to grow in faith by reading and hearing God's word, "So faith comes from hearing, and hearing through the word of Christ (Romans 10:17)." (3) Faith is an action word. We've heard the phrase, "God won't give you anything you can't handle." But God will place us in areas and situations we can't handle, and we lean on him and take action by faith.

Look to Jesus. During his talk, the students were blindfolded as Chris read about Jesus healing blind Bartimaeus in Mark 10. Bart acted in faith. He knew whom he was crying out to as he screamed, "Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!" In that statement Bart knew the object of his faith, and had knowledge of the same object, Jesus. He acted in calling out to Jesus and requesting, "Teacher, let me recover my sight." He knew and acted. We can look to Jesus in that same way.

Release your resentment. Chris walked all of us through a powerful exercise of Biblical forgiveness. He read from Matthew as his followers ask how many times we are to forgive, not 7 but 70 times 7. This was his way of saying we are to practice unlimited forgiveness to those who have wronged and hurt us. This is in no way simple or easy. We lean on Jesus and his grace given to us. The students were given time to acknowledge the hurt they have experienced through others and give this over to God.

Run with joy. Closing with Chris's statements can be a catalyst for joy in our lives. Through Ephesians 2, God declares us as 'loveable', 'fixable', 'timeless', 'priceless', and 'God's Masterpiece'! In Jesus Christ, God has given us a new nature. We are new creations. We are transformed! Chris shared, "We aren't seen as converted caterpillars, we're revealed as beautiful, monarch butterflies!" May these truths give us pause and great joy and help us run our race with Jesus.



The Easter robin story


