The shepherd's door

While traveling in Iran, writer Eric Bishop asked a villager about an earthen enclosure topped with dry thorns. The man said sheep stayed in the round space at night for safety.

"What are the thorns for?" Bishop asked. "If a wolf tries to break in and attack the sheep," the man replied, "he'll knock against the thorns, and they'll make a noise, and the shepherd will wake up and drive off the wolf."

Pointing out the enclosure's open entrance, Bishop asked why a wolf wouldn't just enter there. Because, replied the villager, "that's where the shepherd sleeps; the shepherd is the door."

Suddenly Bishop understood why in John 10 Jesus calls himself first the door, or gate, for the sheep and then the Good Shepherd. Because Jesus is the shepherd, he's also the door that keeps us, his sheep, safe within his care.

Egg-stra facts

>Although Easter eggs were once part of pagan spring festivals, they've become Christian symbols of new life. A cracked-open shell also represents Jesus' empty tomb on Easter morning.



>The early Christians of Mesopotamia began staining eggs red in

honor of Jesus' blood shed on the cross. Red eggs remain part of Greek Orthodox celebrations today.

>For Lent, some families used to give up eggs and dairy, so they prepared a pancake feast on Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday. They solved the egg surplus by hard-boiling them in various broths, which led to colored eggs.

>In medieval times, churches held "egg-throwing" festivals. The priest threw a hardboiled egg toward the choir boys, who tossed it back and forth. When the clock struck 12, whoever was holding the egg got to keep it.

>In some European countries, children go from house to house to collect Easter eggs.

>Each year, the PAAS Dye Co. sells more than 10 million egg-coloring kits, which consumers use to decorate 180 million eggs.

>The tallest chocolate Easter egg ever produced weighed 16,000 pounds — more than an elephant!

So What? Now What?

Please indulge me as I use a past article to reflect on Good Friday and Easter. Dr. Howard Hendricks, a renowned Dallas Theological seminary professor, who passed in 2013 taught his students to answer the first question above when preaching. Pastor Rick Warren seeks to answer the second question when he preaches. I believe in a nutshell they are saying, "We answer why does it matter and what do we do with what we have learned." With Good Friday and Easter Sunday in view, let's try to examine this in light of the cross and the resurrection.

Why the cross? "For the word of the cross is folly to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God (1 Corinthians 1:18)." When we draw near to the cross we experience the radiance of God's glory, we witness the boundlessness of God's mercy and we are given what we our hearts, minds and souls have always needed and desired, LOVE. Jesus gives all of Himself and takes upon Himself the weight and penalty of our sin and declares to us, "I love you and I forgive you!"

Our works and our efforts to earn our way to God and to heaven are desperate and futile. The cross shows us that Jesus did for us what we could never do on our own, "he saved us, not because of works done by us in right-eousness, but according to his own mercy, by the washing of regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit (Titus 3:5)." **So what?** Dear Christian, you are dearly loved, forgiven and cleansed by the blood of the Lamb!

Why the resurrection? The one who conquered death, who comes alive makes us alive in Him! I realize I'm using a long passage, but this is great stuff! Consider the glorious implications of the resurrection, because of God, for our behalf. "But God, being rich in mercy, because of the great love with which he loved us, even when we were dead in our trespasses, made us ALIVE TOGETH-ER WITH CHRIST – by grace you have been saved – and RAISED US UP with him and seated us with him in the heavenly places IN Christ Jesus (Ephesians 2:4-6)..." **So what?** Dear believer, you are a new creation in Christ Jesus (2 Corinthians 5:17), you are newly alive, saved and raised up with Christ and have gained access and inheritance in a new family and a home in heaven!

Now what? A mentor and friend sent me this as a reflection on Good Friday. I think it shows all of us a way to respond and live in light of the cross, "**Go to the cross of Christ**, all you that want to be delivered from the power of selfishness. Go and see what a price was paid there to provide a ransom for your soul. Go and see what an astounding sacrifice was there made, that a door

The origin of "Easter"

It's not certain where the word Easter, which never appears in Scripture, originates. In some places, the day is called Pasch, which comes from "Passover," the festival during which Jesus was crucified. Others call it Resurrection Sunday.

Some scholars think the church absorbed the word Easter from pagan roots, because the goddess of spring, Eostre, was celebrated about the same time as Passover.

Others suggest the word derives from an old Latin phrase referring to the white robes traditionally worn by people being baptized on the Sunday that celebrates Jesus' resurrection.


