Anna M. Jarvis (1864-1948) loved her mother dearly. It was Miss Jarvis who first suggested a national day to honor all mothers. At a memorial service for her mother on May 10, 1908, Anna gave a carnation, her mother's favorite flower, to each person in attendance. Within a few years, the idea to honor mothers gained popularity, and Mother's Day was soon observed annually in many large cities of the United States.

Nonetheless, you can find solutions to simple and difficult problems alike by approaching them a particular way. While this approach to problem-solving isn't the only way, it's one way that's particularly effective. Have you ever sat around wishing something should be done about a problem? You're not alone because a lot of people feel that way.

Once when I complained to another teacher about a problem in school, the teacher asked, "So what are you doing to solve the situation?" I gave it a little thought and said, "I can't think of a thing."

By keeping quiet and not thinking what to do about the issue, I was part of the problem! Being quiet had its benefits. I could just complain and wish that things could be better. That way I was off the hook.

Several years ago, an expensive laboratory jet was approaching Edwards Air Force Base in California. When the pilot tried to lower the nose wheel to landing position, it didn't respond.

The co-pilot ran a quick check and traced the problem to a faulty relay panel. Recognizing the problem, he hunted around for something to bypass the relay and activate the nose gear.

He found a paper clip and bent it so that it bypassed the problem and triggered the nose gear. It worked like a charm, saving the expensive jet, not to mention the crew, from a crash landing.

At that moment, for that special job, the lowly paper clip was more important than the rest of the expensive, sophisticated equipment on the plane.

If God wants us at a specific moment, for a special job, are we willing to be shaped into the solution?

From Pastor Jay

I believe there is something so extraordinary and life-giving shown to us in the book of Hebrews. God has opened to us a pathway to come to Him. He has permitted a way of access where we can go to Him in complete confidence. There is a former way of God that has been replaced by the better, even best way. The law and the sacrificial system have been replaced by the grace given to us in Jesus Christ. Let's consider God's love as we take in the passage.

**Hebrews 10** 19 Therefore, brothers, since we have confidence to enter the holy places by the blood of Jesus, 20 by the new and living way that he opened for us through the curtain, that is, through his flesh,

Our own conception of love often comes through the lens of romance, where love is flickering and fading. Here we see it through what Jesus has completed on the cross. He makes it possible for us to encounter Him through his blood. Once where only a high priest could enter the Holy of Holies, our true high priest, Jesus, makes a way, tearing apart the curtain. His body was torn, Christ's blood was shed, death was arrested and defeated, and now we can come to Him with complete joy and confidence! This passage reveals the stamp of permanence and sun displaying brilliance. The brilliance of the Spirit enabled author and the excellence of the founder and perfecter of our faith (Hebrews 12:2), our Lord Jesus.

21 and since we have a great priest over the house of God, 22 let us draw near with a true heart in full assurance of faith, with our hearts sprinkled clean from an evil conscience and our bodies washed with pure water. 23 Let us hold fast the confession of our hope without wavering, for he who promised is faithful.

Because there is One who intercedes and dies for us. Because His death and resurrection washes away the dirt and grime of our own sin and shame. Because of His holiness and righteousness, we can be made holy and righteous. We have been washed. We are cleansed. We are made whole. We can fully breathe, inhaling and exhaling God's love with a clear conscience. What wonderful reminders of how we can come near to God in 'full assurance of faith' and be unwavering in our 'confession of hope'. Even though we are unfaithful, God remains faithful.

We know this. We have heard this good news. We clench God's grace and make it our own story and song. But, I love that God takes this to another place, because He was sacrificial, He has also become personal, drawing us in fellowship with Himself and now calling us to be communal. To put it another

way, as God gives us access to Himself, He calls us to community with one another.

24 And let us consider how to stir up one another to love and good works, 25 not neglecting to meet together, as is the habit of some, but encouraging one another, and all the more as you see the Day drawing near.

There is the Day all of us in Christ are coming closer to, a final destination for the children of God. We know there are abounding blessings God has given us. We also know life comes with hardship, hurt, and brokenness. Fellowship and community helps us walk towards that glorious day. I memorized verses 24-25 as a young believer as it taught me the value of fellowship. What I didn't recognize that there is a greater weight toward the importance of life-giving, self-dying, continually meeting, always praying community.

As Jesus made it possible for us to know God, we are to give one another permission to deeply know each other. As God opens a way to us, we are to open up our lives to one another. May we strive to live this out, and may our love and good works abound to our brothers and sisters in Christ, and to our neighbors who need to see and know God. "I'm so glad I'm a part of the Family of God!"







# MILIK 50th anniversary

# Oh How I Love Jesus



Frederick Whitfield knew that there is a great difference between liking and loving. He was committed to loving Jesus.

Whitfield wrote the words to the hymn, "Oh How I Love Jesus." He was born on a cold January day in tiny Threapwood, England, population about 250, on Jan. 7, 1829. After attending Trinity College in Dublin, Ireland, he became an Anglican Church clergyman.

His greatest legacy is this hymn about the name of Jesus. It was written when he was a student. It's interesting to know that while Whitfield wrote the words, he didn't write the melody. The tune is an American melody of unknown origin, but it's typical of camp meeting songs that emerged in America in the early 19th century.

In less than ten years after its first printing, the hymn began to appear in hymnals in America. However, most churches on the western frontier, and small churches in the eastern states usually only had one copy of a songbook, and it contained only the words.

As a result, the preacher or song leader would call out the name of the tune and then would "line out" the hymn. "Line out" means the preacher would read the lines ahead of time, line-by-line as the congregation sang the hymn.

The refrain is not part of Whitfield's original hymn, but was later added by some unknown person. The tune has a simple but uplifting style. It's a simple song with a deep meaning.

#### Music

There's a reason why churches incorporates music into the act of worship. Music stirs some portion of our hearts that intellect alone cannot touch. When you think about it, it's strange that music should exist at all. But somewhere, at some time, someone sang the first song — and it was a gift of God's grace.



# The painter of light

Probably the most successful artist in America was Thomas Kinkade, sometimes called the painter of light. Kinkade was a devout Christian who tried to allow God to speak to people through his paintings.

His work usually portrayed Victorian-type villages featuring inviting churches, attractive cottages often made of stone and lighted from within by romantic fireplaces, candles and lamps. The alluring home and the evergreen trees generously placed in the land-scape may be covered by snow. Each of Kinkade's paintings purposely carries a message of faith, family and love.

One painting done by Kinkade is called The Mountain Chapel. It has a mountain landscape with light suggesting the glory of God pouring

with light suggesting the glory of God pouring through the clouds, and a little chapel by some water. When someone sees the little country church, he said, they would be reminded that faith is a foundation for living. A cottage reminds one of family and home.

Kinkade signed each painting with the ancient Christian symbol of a fish and a Bible reference. His Christian witness was through art that lifts up the themes of faith, family and love. His work offered him a method of bearing his Christian witness.

His paintings were meant to inspire and help us remember that the loveliness of much of nature and the warmth of a peaceful home can lift our spirits and spur our gratitude to God.
