

Making a difference

When you serve on a church committee, you make a big difference in people experiencing the hope and healing power of the Gospel. When you serve in Christ's name, you do more than fill a gap. You discover a purpose that you didn't know was waiting for you, and forge relationships you didn't know you were missing.

All believers are endowed by God with unique spiritual gifts. In addition everyone has special talents. Use yours so that you can make the impact God has designed for you to make. "Each one should use whatever gift he has received to serve others, faithfully administering God's grace in its various forms." (1 Peter 4:10).

Besides serving on committees there are "behind the scenes" positions that are useful to the ministry of the church. People serving "behind-the-scenes" help to provide a worshipful experience for all who attend.

Serve, and watch what happens.

Sharing the same observance

In 1936, a group of pastors launched World-Wide Communion Day. Amid the Great Depression, they were looking for a way to meet people's spiritual needs and unite Christians in their dedication to Christ.

The observance, now known as World Communion Sunday, is held on the first Sunday of October. For eight decades, it has served as a reminder that Christians around the globe share the same meal in remembrance of Jesus.

Early Christian unsung heroes

We hear a lot about Paul, Peter, James and John. But there are several people in the New Testament that slip by us unnoticed. Even though they are mentioned briefly, they demonstrate lessons for us today.

One of the most important unsung heroes was Gamaliel. He was a first-century Jewish rabbi and a leader in the Jewish Sanhedrin. In Acts Chapter 5, John and Peter were standing trial in front of the Sanhedrin.

The council wanted the apostles to stop preaching in the name of Jesus. The council became very angry when Peter said they had no intention of stopping. He enraged the council who began to seek the death of the apostles.

Into the fray stepped Gamaliel. The rabbi, "who was honored by all the people", first ordered the apostles to be removed from the room. Gamaliel then said, "In the present case I advise you: Leave these men alone! Let them go" The Sanhedrin were persuaded by Gamaliel's words. That the council yielded to his advice speaks to the influence that Gamaliel possessed.

Barnabas was another unsung hero of the early church. He was from Cyprus which was famous for its vineyards, wheat, oil, and figs. To own land there a person had to be rich, and influential. Yet, Barnabas surrendered his fortune. When he heard about the needs of the early church he sold his land, and brought the money and laid it at the apostle's feet.

There are a many other unsung New Testament Christians. For instance, Acts 16:13-15 records that Lydia opened her home to Paul, from which he led many to Christ and founded a church in Philippi. In Acts 17:5-9, Jason risked his life for the gospel by allowing Paul to stay in his home. He stood up for what was true and right, even though he faced persecution for it.

The early church would have struggled if it hadn't been for the unsung heroes, the men and women who through some small but committed act moved the church forward.

What about us? We will probably not have our names mentioned on the pages of church history books. But the witness and service of God's unsung heroes – the average people in every local church – will bear fruit in their communities.

From Pastor Jay

James 1 2 Consider it pure joy, my brothers and sisters, whenever you face trials of many kinds, 3 because you know that the testing of your faith produces perseverance. 4 Let perseverance finish its work so that you may be mature and complete, not lacking anything (NIV, 2011).

Do you remember Mad Libs? It wasn't something I played a lot as a kid, but it certainly made an impression. You simply create a story of your own by filling in the blanks. You use your own nouns, verbs, adjectives, etc. And what usually is produced is something quite funny, and usually inappropriate. Well, maybe in our household.

The book of James is written to Jewish Christians who have departed Jerusalem and are scattered throughout. We are studying the book in our Wednesday Bible Study at 6:30, and we'd love for you to join us! I may be treading on dangerous ground here, but I want us to consider what we might do as Christians to the passage above, treating James's command as a Mad Lib as opposed to what is given.

Consider it pure joy, my dear <u>friends</u> whenever you face <u>good things</u>, <u>blessings</u>, <u>happy thoughts</u>, <u>receive cards and gifts</u>, or <u>go to Disneyworld</u>. Doesn't that fit, or maybe sound better with <u>joy</u> than with what James asserts? I might think of <u>joy</u> that goes along with the positive things we receive. This is not his intention at all. James is challenging us to receive our respective <u>trials</u> not as <u>sadness</u> or <u>melancholy</u> or <u>discouragement</u> but with <u>joy</u>.

Not many will equate <u>joy</u> and <u>trials</u>. What about sickness? What about struggling financially? What about marital and relationship heartbreak? What about mockery or persecution of faith? All of these become challenges for us, but James certainly gives us a different way of looking at our <u>trials</u>. But he has reasons and he gives us them. We also can't forget that James qualifies <u>trials</u>. Notice the verse above. It's not <u>if</u> you meet these <u>trials</u>, it's <u>when</u> you meet them. <u>Trials</u> are no respecter of persons, as we've heard that phrase before. They come for everyone.

What are James's reasons? The <u>testing</u> (<u>proving</u> or <u>examination</u>) of your <u>faith</u> (<u>belief, trust in God</u>) produces <u>steadfastness</u>. I know for myself and for some of us, the <u>testing</u> and <u>trials</u> of our <u>faith</u> have produced a lot of things: doubt and unbelief, questions, anger, loneliness, bitterness, self-pity, etc. But, what does James say about <u>trials</u> and <u>testing</u>? <u>Faith</u> produces <u>perseverance</u>. <u>Faith</u> produces <u>steadfastness</u>. <u>Faith</u> produces in us a hang in there, hold the rope mentality. <u>Faith</u> gives the Holy Spirit something to work with as we partner with Him. Because we're not depending on ourselves, we're cooperating, trust-

ing, submitting, and obeying God.

<u>Faith</u> not only has a process, it also has a finished work. That's something we are to keep in mind. Thankfully, there is a graduation day. Remember Paul declaring in Philippians that "to live is Christ and to die is gain"? This is a great reminder for us that in the <u>testing</u>, in the <u>persevering</u>, even in the <u>suffering</u>, we have the opportunity to see that Jesus was in all of it. Because, Paul was saying that all of these point me to experience Jesus Christ, in both joy and suffering.

When <u>perseverance</u> finishes its work, James shares that we will be what? Not naïve, immature, and unfinished, but <u>mature</u> and <u>complete</u>. In other translations, it would say <u>perfect</u>. This graduation day is coming for those whose trust is in the Lord Jesus Christ. This graduation day is coming for those who <u>persevere</u> and remain <u>steadfast</u>, not solely through our own wares and strength, but through the reliance of the Holy Spirit within us. To die, according to Paul, but most importantly to Christ, for we will have an eternal home with Him, is truly gain. May we re-frame and re-consider the difficult and often impossible trials that God places in our lives. They are not there to discourage us or punish us, but to strengthen, mature and perfect us.

Please pass the salt

 \mathbb{W} hen a group gathers at a table to enjoy a good meal, no sooner are the plates filled than the salt shaker begins making its rounds so that everyone may season the food to their liking. Many a meal would be far less tasty if salt was not readily at hand!

Jesus tells those of us who follow him that we are "the salt of the earth." Since ancient times, salt has been used not only as a seasoning to enhance flavor, but also as a preservative. Long before refrigeration was available, salt was coarsely rubbed into meat so that it could be saved and stored over time, remaining useful for nourishment.

As the "salt of the earth," there is a quality about us, a "flavor" that should enhance the quality of life for those around us. It should make people thirsty for the living water, generating an awareness of spiritual need that can only be quenched by the presence of the Spirit given to those who come to faith in our Lord Jesus. (John 7:37-39)

Jesus includes with this charge a warning, however: Salt that "loses its saltiness" becomes useless and is tossed aside. The "salt" to which Jesus was referring was a course white powder mined from the area of the Dead Sea. Over time, the sodium chloride would leach out of the powder. No longer useful it was discarded.

So also we, as followers of Jesus, must remain in him and so retain those qualities that arise out of devotion to Jesus and commitment to the way of Christ—the fruit of the Spirit, love for one another and Holiness. (John 15:4-5; Galatians 5:22-23)

Even these qualities may lose their life-enhancing, culture-preserving and spiritual-thirst-producing qualities when they are only turned inward. Our "saltiness" is useless when we remain in the shaker, when we become inwardly focused only on our personal spirituality or the life of our Christian communities.


