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From Pastor Jay

"We have the technology." I was born in the 70's and I remember that TV show. I think you might, too. Wasn't it the Six Million Dollar Man? Other than Lee Majors, I don't remember many of the actors, but I think it was the character Oscar who spoke the quote above. So grateful for the useless and countless things stored in my memory. Concerning technology, imagine if they had what we have now.

We've spent some time reflecting over the greatest commandment, to love God and to love our neighbors as ourselves. In my message several weeks ago, we talked about the motivation of this, the 'why'. Why? Because God is deserving of our love. Because God, in Jesus Christ, first showed his love for us. And, because as we love God with our entire being, we will love others and ourselves, best.

I shared that in the coming weeks we would talk about the 'how'. How? How do we grow in our love for God? There are certainly ways we can answer this through God's Word, but I want to submit a passage that the apostle Peter shares from 2 Peter 1 3 His divine power has given us everything we need for a godly life through our knowledge of him who called us by his own glory and goodness. 4 Through these he has given us his very great and precious promises, so that through them you may participate in the divine nature, having escaped the corruption in the world caused by evil desires.

We don't just have the technology, we have the tools. We don't just have the tools, as you see in the Word we have God's Divine Power within us. Wonder working power through the Holy Spirit. Power to move us, to sustain us, to keep us faithful, and to love God by living a godly life in knowing Him. God doesn't stop giving us His love. His love flows and overflows into our daily lives. But we play a part in this divine process. We'll get to this soon.

God doesn't stop giving. The verse above shares that he has called us. Out of his own glory and goodness, he brought us into relationship with Jesus. The blessings continue as he calls us His own. We have power. We have God's promises. We are participants in God's divine nature and activity. I don't have color or a painting to describe these things. I simply use these words to inform you and me that God loves us this much! He wants us to live full and abundant lives. He wants us to live in joy, peace, and victory. His promise is that He will never leave us or forsake us. As we think of the woman in John 4, Jesus is the well where we never need to thirst. We are both divine nature participators, all the while being, evil world escapers.

So Peter shares with us how we do this. Peter gives us understanding of what it means to grow. Now remember, the key is effort, not earning. I'll say it again EFFORT not EARNING. We are not seeking reward to gain God's love for us. We already have His love. We aren't going after these things so that we become self-righteous. Christ's righteousness is already given to us. Peter even words it so.

5 For this very reason, make every effort to add to your faith goodness; and to goodness, knowledge; 6 and to knowledge, self-control; and to self-control, perseverance; and to perseverance, godliness; 7 and to godliness, mutual affection; and to mutual affection, love.

With Christ living within us and with Holy Spirit power put forth this effort. And add to your faith these qualities. Peter doesn't say it, but isn't it possible that these are also Fruit given by the Spirit. Add these things. Pray these things. Live them out before your family, your friends, your church family. Add. Pray. Practice. Discipline yourselves. Demonstrate. Grow. These are a lot of verses to take in. Peter further punctuates the passage and ends with this helpful exclamation point! He tells us 'why' it's important to grow. Why?

8 For if you possess these qualities in increasing measure, they will keep you from being ineffective and unproductive in your knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ. 9 But whoever does not have them is nearsighted and blind, forgetting that they have been cleansed from their past sins. 10 Therefore, my brothers and sisters, make every effort to confirm your calling and election. For if you do these things, you will never stumble, 11 and you will receive a rich welcome into the eternal kingdom of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ.

With Christ and His Spirit in us, may we keep our sights, set upon Him. May we be effective, productive, fruitful servants of Jesus Christ. And give Him the glory.

Kodiak Baptist Mission Trip - 2018 By Jim and Cathy Vance

We tell our friends "We are going to Alaska". Our friends ask: "Is it cold there? Do you have family in Kodiak? Will you see the Eskimos? etc."

We went to Kodiak Baptist Mission on Kodiak Island Alaska on a mission trip and experienced the rain forest climate. COLD not in the summer, the temperature ranges from 490 to 700 on the rainy days. When the temperature rises to 750, it is warm and the inhabitants are feeling too warm. It is daylight approximately 19 hours a day in late July and diminishes approximately five (5) minutes each day.

The cool temperatures, rainy days and short summer season, create challenges for growing crops for food. The raised bed gardens, ideal for drainage that we constructed 2 years ago are filled with beets, radishes, and leafy green vegetables, these crops do not require pollination and grow well in cool temperatures. Potatoes have been planted in the field and are growing well in the wet soil. Tomatoes and squash are planted in a greenhouse; these crops require pollination and are pollinated by hand/electric toothbrushes.

Family? YES, although we have known Johnny and Robin Walker for a short time, they are family. Johnny felt the call to go to KBM to work with the horse program; he is currently the Executive Director and has answered the call to preach. Robin assists in the office and oversees registration for the summer camp program. Johnny and Robin are also serving as grandparents to the KBM children. The staff at KBM are our brothers and sisters in Christ. A requirement for KBM staff is to be Christian.

Eskimos? NO. The Aleuts are indigenous people of the Aleutian Islands. A large part of the population of Kodiak consists of folks from the Lower 48, the Philippine Islands and Russia. Kodiak, population is 6,130 as of the 2010 census, is home to the largest Coast Guard Base in the world. People from Russia had a settlement on Woody Island, the original site of KBM. The population on Woody is two.

Kodiak Baptist Mission provides a food bank, pre-school, day care after school programs and summer camps for the children on Kodiak and the surrounding Islands. Matt and Tammy Jones continue the Ouzinkie Mission.

Johnny Walker and the staff of KBM are re-establishing the farming community with cows, horses, pigs, chickens, goats, ducks and rabbits. This will provide food for the community and teach sustainability.

Living in time

If you have ever sung in a choir or played in a band you know how important it is for everyone to be on the same beat. It is typical for each participant to have rehearsed their part.

It is also very likely the director/conductor has worked with the different sections of voices or instrumentation to prepare the group to play together. Whether one plays/sings the melody or another part, everyone must be in the same time for the performance to be done well.



When I was in high school many years ago, I was privileged to participate in several honor performance groups. Our band/orchestra director would work with us so we would learn the music. He made us practice and practice even more so when we got to the time of the performance we would be ready to be our best.

However, when we got to the actual time of the performance there would be a "guest conductor" who would lead. He/she would have us express their own interpretation of the music. They would often change the flow of each piece to reflect or emphasize how they felt the music should move.

No matter how well we knew the music we had to keep our eyes on the conductor so we could stay in time with the rest of the orchestra. To perform well in a band/ orchestra/chorus one must practice their part. And as my first band director said, "You must practice correctly as practice does not make perfect, it makes permanent."

It is in our correct practice that we prepare to be part of the performance. To perform well you must also follow the direction of the conductor/director and play/sing in time with the time set by him/her.

The same can be said of our daily living. We choose each day how we are to live. Do you march to your own beat or do you live in time - in rhythm following the direction of God?

Our trusty teammates from Tel City and Nashville, Indiana joined us on Friday. The KBM staff and volunteers were preparing for a rodeo, a first for Kodiak and many of us. Jim helped to transport horses, tents, and other necessities to Northland Ranch for the rodeo. Some of us helped to prepare the brisket and ribs to be for the event. Doug, the children's' HERO, began the repairs on riding toys and lawn mowers.

On Saturday, we were off early for the excitement of the rodeo. Our activities that day included, balloons for the shooting ride event, face painting, balloon animals etc. for the children's tent, serving food and directing traffic.

Sunday morning we were back at the ranch for a Cowboy breakfast, prepared by Cowboy Dave and Sherry Roberts, followed by Cowboy Church in the barn. Kelly Foreman led the singing and Cowboy Dave presented at inspiring sermon.

Each day started with Chapel, led by John Zinck and Kelly Foreman. On Monday, Johnny Walker told us the priority projects that he would like for us to concentrate on during our stay. Complete the milk room, clean the hog pens, organize the loft, hill up the potatoes, mow the grass, transport the horses to Woody and scrape the fence.

Our work began with Doug and Jim repairing toys and lawn mowers, Daphne and Nancy accessing their organization skills and strong-arm labor on that loft. With several others involved in the loft we "found the floor" organized the camp gear, life vests, car seats, household furnishings, etc.

The milk room has to completed to commercial specifications so that the goat milk, ice cream and cheese can be sold. Richard, from the Indiana team, is an electrician and could do the wiring and lighting, Bill was experienced in hanging the tub surround and completed much of the milking room with the help of the WV team.

The potatoes were hilled up, the lawn mowers and weed eaters got a work out. Two of our team members watered and pollinated plants in the greenhouse. John, from the KBM staff, cleaned the hog pens for us and we appreciated his intervention.

Our trip was not all work. We enjoyed some fishing, sight seeing beautiful scenery, bears, whales, and eagles, etc. and visiting with old and new friends. We are truly blessed to be such a small part in God's great plan. We thank our church friends and family for your prayers, love and support.
