#### Mother's Day

The official flower of Mother's Day is the carnation, the favorite flower of the mom of the holiday's founder, Anna Jarvis (who lived in Grafton, West Virginia). Over time, the custom arose of wearing a white carnation on Mother's Day if your mother has died and a red one if she's living.



In fact, many carnation colors have special meanings. Pink carries the richest Christian symbolism. According to legend, carnations first appeared on earth as Mary wept while watching Jesus carry his cross. Where her tears fell, there appeared pink carnations, symbolizing a mother's undying love.

#### **Music and worship**

There are 150 hymns in the book of Psalms. The Psalms are composed of devotional hymns, heartfelt praise and personal testimonies of praise and thanksgiving to the Lord. Some give far reaching predictions.



For instance, Psalm 2 is a view of the Messiah's redemptive career and His return as King of Kings. Psalm 22 is an amazing detailed prophecy of the suffering and death of Christ. Psalm 16 heralds His future resurrection

These 150 hymns were widely used in worship services in temples and synagogues in Israel. The Psalms have been cherished by God's people since they were first written. Many agree that in all the Old Testament there is no more practical, instructive, beautiful or popular book than the Psalms.

Music has had a positive relationship with our Christian faith for centuries. On the night of his betrayal, Jesus and his disciples sang a Passover hymn. In Matt. 26:30 (NIV) we read, "*When they had sung a hymn, they went out to the Mount of Olives."* Since then, music and verse has been a dominate part of Christian life and worship.

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<u>Historical note</u>: After Moses led the Israelites across the Red Sea, they paused and sang to the Lord: "*I will sing to the Lord for he is highly exalted."* (*Exodus15 :1*)


We enjoy these themes and characters and I believe (seriously, I do!) we can all find them in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. He is our one true hero. These themes were found in the works of J.R.R. Tolkien and C.S. Lewis decades ago, and yes, we can truly find them in our modern day stories: Marvel, Disney, Harry Potter, Star Wars, etc. Whether we enjoy, dismiss, or disagree with them, their message resonates and captivates, and I believe there are gospel strands to our hero, Jesus.

This is the message of the gospel and our Lord's resurrection: Jesus, "who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God (Hebrews 12:2b)." Jesus, "For in him all the fullness of God was pleased to dwell, and through him to reconcile to himself all things, whether on earth or in heaven, making peace by the blood of his cross (Colossians 1:19-20)."


