Lent

Though the date of Easter varies, the majority of the Lenten season occurs during March. In fact, the word Lent comes from the Anglo-Saxon words lenctentid (meaning "March") and lencten (meaning "spring").

The first reference to Lent dates back to 325 AD, in one of the 20 canons decreed at the council of Nicaea. By the eighth century, Christians started observing Lent, and a 10th-century monk named Aelfric connected the use of ashes and "the Lenten fast" to the pre-Easter period.

Lent lasts 40 days to represent Jesus' time in the wilderness, when he was tempted by the devil. The six Sundays that occur between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday aren't counted as part of Lent; instead, as the traditional day of worship, they're considered "mini-Easters." <u>Lent this year begins on Sunday, March 1</u>.

Three in One

Everyday objects can serve as simple lessons about biblical truth. During winter, you can point to a kid-friendly snowman to describe how God is "Three in One."

The ball of snow on the base represents God, our strong foundation. The middle ball, with stick arms on the side, reminds us of Jesus, who died on the cross. And the snowman's head stands for the Holy Spirit, who helps us and speaks God's truth to us.



Dealing with a crisis

As some of you know - who have experienced such a crisis - losing a spouse is a traumatic event. There is a deep loneliness that occurs from being separated from the person you vowed to love forever. But because Jesus is who we say we believe him to be, we can depend upon him to be by our side.

During any crisis there are times when we may feel that life has put us through the rinse cycle. We wonder where and how we will find some relief. Jesus said, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give your rest."

This past year, I found that no matter how serious a crisis is that we have, God will get us through. Psalm 27:1 says, "The Lord is my light and my salvation – whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life – of whom shall I be afraid?"

One of my favorite authors, Ralph Waldo Emerson, said "A day is a miniature eternity!" There is some truth in that statement, because in each 24 hours there are blessings to be received if we look for them. I have learned that I should treasure today's blessings because they are more valuable than money.

God's middle C

A band director tapped a tuning fork on his music stand. "That's middle C," he told his students, "It was middle C yesterday. It will be middle C tomorrow - and in the future. One of our flutes plays flat, the French horn is out of tune, but that is middle C. The flute and French Horn needs to adjust and match the sound of middle C."

If middle C's pitch value varied, and wasn't exactly 261.63 Hz, it would be impossible to tune instruments. That exactness is comforting for musicians, and their listeners.

From Pastor Jay

This was the third High School Convention I attended with Jacob and his two good friends. There were about 200 students attending from all over the state. Our host was Gassaway Baptist Church and we had a great time together. Mike Distefano was our speaker. He is the Regional Impact Director for the mission called Amirah. Amirah, meaning 'princess' in Arabic, is a mission, from the amirahinc.org website, "to provide refuge for those seeking to break free from exploitation and heal in community on their journey toward lasting hope."

Pastor Mike shared the heartbreaking reality that there are 500,000 girls in the U.S. who are involved in sex trafficking. Amirah is "a multi-faceted aftercare organization for survivors of sex trafficking, providing residential, outreach, and education services." He did a wonderful job communicating to the students, although I had hoped he would share more about the mission he serves.

Here are some quotes and notes from Mike Distefano's messages. While we were in a leaders meeting he shared, possibly my favorite one, "High School students listen more than you think, but they don't have the people skills to be polite with their face!" In his first message, he spoke from Acts 1. The disciples looked at the risen Lord ascending, and then the two dressed in white robes saying, "why do you stand looking into heaven?" Mike's point was, we were not meant to simply gaze into heaven, we were meant to be on the move with God.

In this movement, the disciples of Jesus are to continually walk with Him, to fight and contend for what matters most, and to join God in this mission of sabotage against the world. We are to be light and restoration in a world that is in darkness and is in need of God's comfort and healing. Mike shared about his time in Prague and his group of friends sharing about Jesus in regions subjected to Communism; they also would go to the Red Light district to evangelize.

He spoke of life being a constant reality of transitions. Where he thought he had arrived and 'made it' at his first ministry position in Houston, he explained the reality and difficulty of his job. He discovered that life after college and adulthood wasn't all that it was cracked up to be. All of life is one major transition, from college, to adulthood, to parenthood, and on. We need a north star to fix us and to ground us.

The north star of course is Jesus, to seek first the kingdom of God and his right-eousness. The north star of Jesus is unchanging and stabilizing. If there is a kingdom, there's a king. This king is life-changing, transforming life and history. He had the power to reverse darkness, loneliness, and sickness. This kingdom reversal also meant restoration and the re-creation of what life was meant to be and will be.

We are to be about the king's business. We lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters. We imitate and emulate the love of God toward others. God is glorified within us as we share and demonstrate God's love with each other. As we have been loved we are to live out this love among others. As we move with God, and climb this mountain of mission, we discover that this is the most beautiful place we could possibly live.


Pastor Mike showed his love for classic writers, J.R.R. Tolkien and C.S. Lewis. Tolkien helped lead Lewis to saving faith in Jesus. Both men inspired each other in their writing. He proceeded to share about Tolkien's understanding and motivation of his classic books, the Lord of the Rings, trilogy. Mike shared of Tolkien, "the ring revealed the story to me." Mike would use the illustration of the ring to describe our own hearts and its condition.

The ring was a treasure that became the characters Gollum's and Frodo's obsession, that ultimately became their master. This was the warning for our high school friends. This is the warning for us as we seek things apart from God. Mike shared from Matthew 6:19-21, "Do not lay up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust destroy and where thieves break in and steal, but lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven...for where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

Apart from Jesus, all that we value and even worship, will lead us to anxiety because they will fail and overwhelm us to the point of always wanting more, but never being enough. In his last message I heard Saturday night, Mike shared the importance of being on the move with God with brothers and sisters, to be a community on mission, to not fight alone, to link together in arms, and pursue the kingdom together. These are wonderful insights from a young and faithful man of God given not only to our young teenagers, but also to us.

School supplies are always needed. These can include paper, pencils, pencil sharpeners, scissors, crayons, and pencil cases. Other miscellaneous items can include sun glasses and flip flops.

Some people begin now to knit crochet items such as hats, sun dresses, short outfits and tote bags. You can take advantage of end of seasonal items, beginning of school deals, and closeouts. Those are good ways to find good quality items before Collection Week.

The most important item we all can contribute is **prayer** for the children who will be receiving your shoeboxes.

By the way, <u>do not</u> include liquids, glass or other breakables, toothpaste or war related items.


Make plans to attend this free event and bring friends and family. CD's and other materials will be available following the concert. A love offering will be taken.

West Virginia Baptist Convention News - Sales Tax Update

On March 8, 2019, the West Virginia Legislature passed House Bill 2813 which requires all marketplace facilitators to start collecting up to a 7% sales tax on all products.

Earlier in the year, the West Virginia Baptist Convention had agreed to a contract with Eventbrite to manage all of their <u>online event registrations</u>.

After receiving notification of the new bill by Eventbrite, we were then informed that, as of September 3, 2019, they would start collecting sales tax on all of our events.

We then began reviewing whether or not we would also have to start charging sales tax on all of our mail-in registrations.

After extensive research and many lengthy discussions with CPAs, lawyers, and other tax professionals, we have been advised of the following:

- > If you register via mail-in registration under the umbrella of your church, you DO NOT have to pay sales tax. However, your church must annually submit their tax-exempt form to the WVBC office in order to be exempt from this tax.
- ➤ If you register via mail-in registration as an individual, you DO have to pay sales tax, since individuals are not exempt.
- ➤ If you register online, you DO have to pay sales tax. Currently Eventbrite does not have any way of checking whether or not you have tax-exempt status and, therefore, are required to charge sales tax on all events.

On January 4th, the WVBC trustees voted to adopt the above understanding of the new tax law unless otherwise notified. In most cases, the tax amount is very minimal but is required to be collected.
